

PROVIDER ACCESS STATEMENT

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Purpose and scope

This statement applies to all secondary and special academies of the Learning Community Trust.

This statement aims to set out the arrangements for managing the access of education and training providers to students for the purpose of giving them information about their offer. It sets out:

- Procedures in relation to requests for access
- The grounds for granting and refusing requests for access
- Details of premises or facilities to be provided to a person who is given access
- For students in specialist settings, or students in our mainstream academies who have complex needs, responsible staff will work with providers to ensure appropriate, meaningful provider access that does not discriminate or breach the equalities act.

Statutory requirements

Academies are required to ensure that there is an opportunity for a range of education and training providers to access young people in years 8 to 13 for the purposes of informing them about approved technical education, qualifications or apprenticeships.

Our Academies must provide a minimum of 6 encounters with technical education or training providers to all young people in years 8 to 13 (see more details below).

Academies must also have a statement that outlines the circumstances in which education and training providers will be given access to these young people.

This is outlined in section 42B of the [Education Act 1997](#), the [Skills and Post-16 Education Act 2022](#) and on page 43 of guidance from the Department for Education (DfE) on [careers guidance and access for education and training providers](#).

This Statement shows how our Trust complies with these requirements across our Academies.

The 6 encounters schools must offer to all young people in years 8 to 13

Schools must offer:

- 2 encounters for young people during the 'first key phase' (year 8 or 9)
 - All young people must attend
 - Encounters can take place any time during year 8, and between 1 September and 28 February during year 9
- 2 encounters for young people during the 'second key phase' (year 10 or 11)
 - All young people must attend
 - Encounters can take place any time during year 10, and between 1 September and 28 February during year 11
- 2 encounters for young people during the 'third key phase' (year 12 or 13)
 - Young people can choose to attend
 - Encounters can take place any time during year 12, and between 1 September and 28 February during year 13

These encounters must happen for a reasonable period of time during the standard school day. Schools can continue to provide complementary experiences but encounters outside of school hours won't count towards these requirements.

Academies must ask each provider to provide the following information as a minimum:

- Information about the provider and the approved qualifications or apprenticeships they offer
- Information about what careers those qualifications and apprenticeships can lead to
- What learning or training with the provider is like
- Answers to any questions from pupils

Meaningful and varied provider encounters and experiences

Each Academy is committed to providing meaningful encounters to all pupils. 1 encounter is defined as 1 meeting/session between pupils and 1 provider. (Refer to making it meaningful checklist to gain additional clarification and support: [1207 - meaningful encounters checklist 1.pdf](#))

All Academies will ensure that young people with SEND and those who do not achieve Level 2 qualifications will progress onto a wide range of 'next step' destinations e.g. specialist provision, supported internships, foundation level courses. Young people with an EHCP will have their needs and aspirations considered when organising provider access. Encounters will be relevant, meaningful aspirational and tailored to the needs of young people.

To ensure this, we:

- Ensure that all young people experience meaningful encounters with opportunity providers of all pathways that they might realistically consider in the future. Where appropriate this will include providers of apprenticeships and technical education.
- Define 'opportunity provider' broadly to include the widest possible range of 'next steps' settings e.g. social care providers, supported employment providers, supported internship providers, entry level vocational course providers, study programme providers, independent specialist colleges.
- Define a representative of a provider as 'any person who is suitably qualified and equipped to support our learners to understand an appropriate pathway' e.g. supported interns, job coaches, foundation learning tutors, SEND experienced careers advisers.
- Carefully consider the timing and format of encounters taking into account our young peoples' specific needs as well as their age/year group.
- Consider the communication skills of our young people and plan encounters with parents and carers where this is the more appropriate way of promoting all pathways in a meaningful way.

All LCT academies will accept live online encounters as part of the programme but should consider a balanced approach.

Previous Providers

In previous years we have arranged encounters with the following providers or representatives of providers for our young people and/or parents and carers:

- A Careers Adviser from 'Future Focus' who could give an informed overview of all pathways
- A visit to 'Juniper' e.g. a local land-based college that offers foundation programmes catering for students up to entry level 3.

In previous terms/years we have invited the following providers from the local area to speak to our young people:

- Juniper
- Telford College
- Shrewsbury College

- Local Authority adult social care
- Specialist colleges, such as Derwen College
- Newport Girls'
- Public sector representatives (Armed forces, NHS)

Destinations of our young people

Young people entitlement

All young people in years 8 to 13 in the Learning Community Trust are entitled to:

- Find out about technical education qualifications and apprenticeship opportunities as part of our careers programme, which provides information on the full range of education and training options available at each transition point
- Learn about links into different careers through subject curriculum delivery
- Hear from a range of local providers about the opportunities they offer, including technical education and apprenticeships, e.g. through activities and events such as options events, assemblies and taster events
- Understand how to make applications for the full range of academic and technical courses

Management of provider access requests

Procedure

The process for providers to follow to ensure effective communication with LCT academies:

- Review the careers section of the Academy's website
- Email specific member of staff identified as the careers lead (cc central admin email address)

Opportunities for access

A number of events, integrated into our careers programme, will offer providers an opportunity to come into academies to speak to students and/or their parents/carers.

The table below outline examples of how LCT academies may provide opportunities for training and education providers to speak to young people and or/their parents. All academies have the freedom within their own academic calendar to adjust and amend the table below to meet their needs and the specific provider requirements.

Granting and refusing access

Young people at LCT will be able to always access opportunities, without restriction and barriers. Curriculum structured career lessons, assemblies and career events will be provided by the Academy which all young people will attend as part of the specific programme for their year group.

Young people with a specific interest in a career path will be provided with time during the Academy day to independently visit providers.

Young people with SEND needs will be supported in line with their EHCP and any additional plans/requirements

Safeguarding

Our safeguarding/child protection policy outlines the Academy's procedure for checking the identity and suitability of visitors.

Education and training providers will be expected to adhere to this statement's requirements.

Premises and facilities

All Academies must provide appropriate facilities to enable the effective delivery from providers. Each Academy may choose to use the following:

- Classrooms
- Main hall
- Hire an external venue

Providers on agreement to present must state the type of venue that is required, any specialist equipment and support they may require.

Academies are required to see any presentation and written materials a minimum of 7 days before the presentation.

Complaints

Any complaints related to provider access can be raised following the Trust's complaints procedure found on the website

Monitoring and review

The Chief Executive Officer will monitor the implementation of this statement, including making sure that it is updated to reflect the needs and circumstances of the Trust and the Academies.
